Shere Abbott UNITED STATES

Shere Abbott is the Associate Director for Environment at the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy. Before her current position, Abbott was director of the Center for Science and Practice of

Sustainability at The University of Texas at Austin and a faculty member in the College of Liberal Arts. Prior to working at The University of Texas, Abbott was chief international officer of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), responsible for the International Office where she established and directed the Center for Science, Innovation and Sustainable Development. Previously, she had consulted on environmental science and sustainable development for private foundations, the World Bank, the Brookings Institution, and other non-governmental organizations. Until 2001, Abbott worked at the National Academies' National Research Council over a 17-year period in several capacities, including executive director of the Board on Sustainable Development, where she directed the Sustainability Transition Study and the Global Change Research Program.



Sandra Charles UNITED STATES

Sandra Charles is President and CEO of C&O Resources, Inc. based in Washington, D.C. She has over 16 years of experience in the United States Government national security and foreign policy commu-

nity. Ms. Charles has previously served as Director of Near East and South Asia Affairs at the National Security Council and Deputy Assistant Secretary (acting) of the Office of the Secretary of Defense, International Security Affairs. She has participated in high level negotiations and policy development on security cooperation, international agreements, foreign military sales, peace initiatives, and crisis management, including the first Bush Administration's policy for Operation Desert Storm.



Hamdi el-Morsi EGYPT

Hamdi el-Morsi is the former chairman of Al-Fath Association for Community Development in Al-Mansoura, Egypt and has researched the leadership role of boards of trustees of charitable as-

sociations and NGOs in Egypt. He is a founding board member of Mogadishu University in Somalia and the Russian Islamic University in Kazan, Russia. Mr. el-Morsi received his Bachelor of Science in biology and his Master's and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Cairo.



H.P. Goldfield

UNITED STATES

H.P. Goldfield is Vice Chairman of Stonebridge International, LLC, where he is responsible for developing and executing Washingtonbased strategies in support of the business goals of Stonebridge's in-

ternational clients. He also leads the Middle East and India practice groups of the company. In his prior public sector service, Mr. Goldfield served as Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Trade Development. This experience and others have provided Mr. Goldfield with extensive expertise on international trade and investment issues. Mr. Goldfield was previously a Member of the Board of Directors of the Overseas Private Investment Corporation and the Export-Import Bank of the United States (ex-officio). He also served as a member of the White House staff under President Ford and as Associate Counsel to President Reagan. In addition, he served as a member of the National Finance Committee for the Bush-Quayle '88 and '92 Presidential campaigns and as Director of Congressional Liaison for Dole/Kemp '96. He was a member of the National Finance Committee for the Bush-Cheney 2000 Presidential campaign and was active in the 2004 campaign. Mr. Goldfield is also a member of the Board of Advisors of the Middle East Institute, and a Member

of the Board of Directors of Black and Veatch Holding Company, the National Chamber Foundation Board and the Israel Policy Forum.



Kamal Helbawy UNITED KINGDOM

Dr. Kamal Helbawy is currently the chairman of the Centre for the Study of Terrorism and an advisor at the Global Civilizations Study Centre, both located in the United Kingdom. Dr. Helbawy was born

in Egypt in 1939 and educated and trained as a political scientist in his home country. He joined the Muslim Brotherhood in 1951, and later served as its official spokesman in the West before resigning in 1997. He has lectured at many universities, travelled worldwide, and has helped establish many institutions, including the World Assembly of Muslim Youth (WAMY). In addition to founding and directing WAMY, Dr. Helbawy was also chairman of the Muslim Association of Britain, founded the Muslim Council of Britain, and was a lecturer at the Institute of Policy Studies in Pakistan. He has written and translated many books and articles on Islam, the West, Islamic movements, and Afghanistan.



Hassan Jaber

UNITED STATES

Hassan Jaber is Executive Director and past CEO of the Arab Community Center for Economic and Social Services (ACCESS). During his tenure, Mr. Jaber has helped transform ACCESS from a

storefront organization into the largest Arab American organization in the country. He has been responsible for developing various social and legal programs, and administering the organization's immigration and advocacy services. He is a major proponent for the advancement of ACCESS' development in the departments of mental and community health, employment services and job training, and his avid support for ushering in the next generation has helped to expand AC-CESS' youth and education services. Mr. Jaber's roles at ACCESS vary from community and government relations, strategic planning and analysis, fund raising and developing and implementation of personnel policies. He now manages an operating budget of more than \$15 million. Mr. Jaber is frequently interviewed by local and national media, including National Public Radio, the BBC, Newsweek, CNN, Fox 2 News, the Detroit News and the Detroit Free Press, as a consultant on the Arab American community. Mr. Jaber has also taught Arabic language and culture at the University of Michigan Dearborn.



Temel Karamollaoğlu TURKEY

Temel Karamollaoğlu is currently serving as Vice President of the Saadet party. Before his current position, he held a number of positions in the government. Between 1967 and 1972, he worked as an expert

in Turkey's State Planning Organization and in 1975 was appointed the General Director of the Incentives and Implementation Office in the Ministry of Science and Technology. In 1977 he was elected as a Member of Parliament from the Welfare Party (MSP) and in 1989 was elected as the Mayor of Sivas. In the 1995 and 1999 General Elections, he was again elected as MP from the Welfare Party, where he served as the Deputy Chairman of the Parliamentary Group of the Welfare Party until 1998. While in the Parliament, he was a member of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe (1977-1980) and later as the member of the Parliamentary Assembly of NATO (1995-2002). After the Constitutional Court banned the Welfare Party, he joined the Virtue Party and later the Saadet Party.



Allen Keiswetter UNITED STATES

Allen Keiswetter, a retired Senior Foreign Service Officer, is a Senior Consultant at C&O Resources, a Scholar at the Middle East Institute and an Adjunct Professor at the University of Maryland. He

served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs from 2000-2001, Director of Arabian Peninsula Affairs in the Near East Bureau (1998-2000) and Director of the Office of Intelligence Liaison in the Bureau of Intelligence and Research (1996-1998) and NATO Deputy Assistant Secretary General for Political Affairs (1993-1996). He also held posts at the US Embassies in Riyadh, Sanaa, Khartoum, Baghdad, Tunis and Beirut. He was Senior Advisor to the US Delegation to the UN General Assembly, chaired the Middle East Working Group on Water Resources, and taught courses on Islam and on the Middle East at the National War College and the National Defense Intelligence College.



John Kerry UNITED STATES

John Kerry is the senior United States Senator from Massachusetts and is the Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Before being elected to the United States Senate in 1984, he served as

Lieutenant Governor of Massachusetts from 1983 until 1985. Since then, he has served in many capacities in the Senate, including as Chairman of the Senate Select Committee on POW/MIA Affairs from 1991 until 1993. In addition to his role as Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, Mr. Kerry currently serves on three other committees: the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Technology; the Finance Committee; and the Committee on Small Business and Entrepreneurship. After graduating from Yale in 1966, he served in Vietnam with the U.S. Military on two tours of duty and received a Silver Star, a Bronze Star with Combat V, and three Purple Hearts.



Michael Levi UNITED STATES

Michael A. Levi is the David M. Rubenstein senior fellow for energy and the environment at the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR). He is director of the CFR program on energy security and

climate change and was project director for the CFRsponsored Independent Task Force on climate change. Dr. Levi was previously a nonresident science fellow and a science and technology fellow in foreign policy studies at the Brookings Institution. Prior to that, he was director of the Federation of American Scientists' Strategic Security Project. His interests center on the intersection of science, technology, and foreign policy, including energy, climate, and nuclear security. He is the author of the book On Nuclear Terrorism (Harvard University Press, 2007) and coauthor with Michael O'Hanlon of The Future of Arms Control (Brookings Institution Press, 2005). His 2005 monograph with Michael D'Arcy, Untapped Potential: U.S. Science and Technology Cooperation with the Islamic World, was the first comprehensive study of science and technology in the Muslim world. Dr. Levi has been invited to testify before Congress and to present expert scientific evidence to the National Academy of Sciences. His essays have been published in Foreign Affairs, Foreign Policy,

Nature, Scientific American, Slate, and the New Repbulic, among others. His op-eds have appeared in the New York Times, Washington Post, Wall Street Journal, and Financial Times.



Doyle McManus UNITED STATES Doyle McManus,

Doyle McManus, Washington columnist for the *Los Angeles Times*, has reported on national and international issues from Washington for 27 years. He has been a foreign correspondent in

Europe, the Middle East and Central America, reported on wars and revolutions in Iran, Iraq and Lebanon, and covered six U.S. presidential elections. McManus is a four-time winner of the National Press Club's Edwin Hood Award for reporting on U.S. foreign policy, most recently in 2004 for articles on the U.S. occupation of Iraq. He has also won Georgetown University's Weintal Prize for diplomatic reporting and other awards. McManus is author or coauthor of three books including Landslide: The Unmaking of the President 1984-88, named by The New York Times as one of the most notable books of 1988. He appears frequently on PBS's "Washington Week" and other television and radio programs, and was a panelist in presidential primary debates in 2000 and 2008. McManus joined the Los Angeles Times in 1978 after three years as a foreign correspondent for United Press International. He reported for the Times in Los Angeles, the Middle East, Central America, New York and Washington, where he served as a State Department correspondent and White House correspondent before he was named bureau chief in 1996. He has also written for Foreign Policy, Time, Sports Illustrated and the London Daily Express.



Mazahir Osman SUDAN

Mazahir Osman is Secretary General of the International Muslim Women's Union (IMWU) and an Assistant Professor at Omdurman Islamic University in Sudan. She has also taught at the International

University of Africa in Khartoum, Al-Ain University in the UAE, and Qatar University. Ms. Osman received her Ph.D. in English Language from Khartoum University.



Jane Perlez UNITED STATES

Jane Perlez is a foreign correspondent for *The New York Times*. She joined the newspaper in 1981, after working for *The New York Post*, *The New York Daily News*, and the *Soho Weekly News*. Ms. Perlez

served as the paper's chief diplomatic correspondent from 1999 to 2001, has been bureau chief for the paper in East Africa, Central Europe and Indonesia, and has been posted to Africa, Poland, Austria, Indonesia, and now Pakistan. Ms. Perlez won the 2009 Pulitzer Prize for International Reporting for her groundbreaking coverage of America's deepening military and political challenges in Afghanistan and Pakistan.



Salman Shaikh UNITED KINGDOM

Salman Shaikh is a nonresident fellow with the Brookings Doha Center, focusing on mediation and conflict resolution issues facing the Middle East and South Asia. His current focus is on the

involvement of radical Islamic parties in peace-making and state-building efforts. He is also a Special Representative to the Muslim West Facts Initiative in Europe. Until recently, he worked as the Director for Policy and Research in the Office of Her Highness, Sheikha Mozah Bint Nasser Al-Missned. Previously, he worked with the United Nations, primarily on Middle East policy-related and peace-making issues, including as the Special Assistant of the UN Special Coordinator for the Middle East Peace Process (2000-2003); the Political Adviser to the UN Personal Representative for Lebanon (2006); the Secretary-General's Special Adviser to the Middle East (2006-2007); and the Special Assistant on the Middle East and Asia to two consecutive heads of the Political Department at UN Headquarters (2003-2006).



Abdirisak Waberi SWEDEN


