The New Suburban Geography

- Brookings-MI County Typology
 - Is Based on Commuting Patterns,
 Land Uses, and Growth Rates
 - Uses Five Categories and Classifies 417 Counties
 - Covers the 50 Most Populous U.S.
 Metropolitan Areas

- Inner Suburb—De Kalb, GA
- Mature Suburb—Fairfax, VA
- Emerging Suburb—Douglas, CO
- Exurb—Pinal, AZ





Gore vs. Kerry Vote 2000/2004




House Vote for Democrats 02/06



Three Parts to the Metropolis


- Cores (Which are Have Long Been Solidly Democratic Areas)

The Urbanizing Suburbs are Key



Washington Metro Vote 2000 v. 2004






'04 Bush V. Kerry 60/40 Split

Conclusions

- Density = Democrats
- Nearly All Population Gains to Mid Century are in Metropolitan Areas
- A Greater Share of Metropolitan
 Growth Will Occur in Built Up Areas
- Republican Rural and Exurban Vote Cannot Offset The Democrats Gains in Urbanizing Suburbs Much Longer
